Riverboat Building offers solid spot for new headquarters


e are excited to announce the purchase of the Riverboat Building in Taylorsville, with plans to relocate our main headquarters there. Our current location on 53rd South in Murray has become too small to effectively serve our business, so this acquisition couldn't have come at a better time.

Initially, we considered constructing an 80,000-square-foot building with an underground parking lot at our current location to meet our needs. However, this proved to be too costly, so we explored other options.

Doug Snow, president of our sister company Beehive Insurance, was facing similar growth challenges and he discovered the Riverboat Building and entered into an agreement to lease space for his company. Doug mentioned that there might be an opportunity for Geneva Rock as well.

We carefully examined the property and thought, "Why not see if we can purchase the entire building and make it our new corporate headquarters?"

So, we entered negotiations with the family that owns the building and were able to make



an agreement to purchase it outright.

"My team has always thought this building would make a spectacular headquarters for a strong company in the valley," says Farran Tozer Brown, director of the Vectra Management Group, the company who previously owned the building. "However, the property was doing quite well, and we weren't necessarily looking to sell. We had just invested a lot into renovations, but when we heard the vision that Geneva Rock had for the property, we couldn't resist building a partnership."


The 100,000-square-foot

Riverboat Building provides ample room for Geneva Rock's continued growth. There are four floors of 25,000 square feet each, and we will occupy the entire fourth floor. Even with the move, we'll easily have room for more than 30 percent growth. Beehive Insurance will lease 16,000 square feet from us on the second floor, and we will share the remaining 9,000 square feet with them with a 64-person training room, gym, conference room, and flex offices

As for the first and third floors, we want previous tenants

to remain, and they're on board with our vision of the future of the building. They like the direction we're going with the property, which includes keeping the historical name "Riverboat Building." It gets its name from the original building on the property, a restaurant in the shape of a Mississippi paddlewheel riverboat. Over time, the owner found a better use for the land, and the current structure was built in 1998.

"Something needs to be said about Geneva Rock's decision to pay homage to the history of the building," Farran says. "The

name is a nod to the history of Taylorsville. We're happy to see the building go to a company that values its history and is committed to preserving it. We're excited to see what Geneva Rock will do with the space and we're confident that they will be good stewards of the building."

What we love about our location in Murray is its central location in the Salt Lake Valley. We were worried about

relocating too far north or south, but the Riverboat Building is only one interchange further north off the freeway, making it easy for both team members and customers to still reach us.

As we relocate, we want to provide a more comfortable and modern work environment for our employees. Substantial renovations are currently underway to ensure we have state-of-the-art facilities. We are completely gutting the

fourth and second floors and are building it from the ground up with an entirely new interior, including the HVAC system.

Outside, we're repaying the parking lot and redoing the sidewalks to meet Geneva Rock's quality standards.

Additional landscaping and roofing renovations will take place over the next five years.

"I'm so proud that this premiere Taylorsville building is now going to be the headquarters of Geneva Rock, which is best in its class," Farran says. "Geneva Rock has always been an important part of the community, and this move will allow the company to better fulfill its mission of Building a


Better Community."

The heart of Utah Valley and the hometown of Brigham Young University and large companies including Nu Skin and Vivint, Provo has needed an update and expansion for a number of city services, highlighted most by the need for 21st Century office space, amenities and police headquarters.

And the results of the new facility, built by Layton Construction and opened last summer, are already being felt for the better.



The new City Hall includes sorely needed public safety improvements, including up-to-date evidence storage capabilities, a crime lab, police dog kennels and emergency operations center. It also houses

office for city departments and legal services.

But getting the landmark erected was no easy task, which builders knew from the beginning.

located right in the middle of Provo's downtown," says Jon Brinkerhoff, director of field operations for Layton Construction. "Access to the site was limited and neighbors were close. Everything about getting materials in place had to be planned and well orchestrated."

It was with these challenges in mind that Layton reached out to Geneva Rock during the bidding process.

"We became involved in the project during the bidding process with Layton Construction," says Mark Memmott, concrete ready-mix salesman for Utah County. "We worked the Layton team through the bidding process and were

proud to be with them the whole way."

The partnership with Lavton Construction has been an important one for Geneva Rock for decades.

"When bidding work with Geneva, we have all the confidence that there aren't any hidden costs and that our expectations will be met with a fair price. Often times, pricing in material costs change, but once Geneva bids a job, the price is the price."

And, Geneva also works to make sure their trusted partners get the materials and service they were promised.

"We serviced this project through two cement shortages," says Terrence Savage, vice president of concrete for Geneva Rock. "Supply of cement was tight, and it had a big impact on our market. We worked very closely with Layton to ensure they had the Ready-Mix concrete available when they needed it. This was achieved by working together in order to achieve the requirements of this project."

This came with some difficulty and took planning, but is what good partners do.

"This is how you build a 40plus year partnership," Terrence says. "You recognize the need of the partner and fully commit to each other."

For Layton, the ability to count on suppliers and partners enables the company to deliver predictable outcomes to clients, a key to the success of the new Provo City Hall.

"Provo City Hall was designed to be the centerpiece for the city," Jon says. "Without predictable outcomes, the vision the design team had may have looked different. Geneva provided colored and gray concrete so consistently, the color match was perfect. The colors were very important to the owner for the aesthetic value of the design."

Consistent outcomes is what partners learn to expect from Geneva and what clients appreciate from Layton.

Habitat for Humanity donation benefits family new to Utah

eneva Rock has always been committed to Building a Better Community. To that end, in collaboration with the Utah Ready-Mixed Concrete Association (URMCA), Geneva Rock recently donated \$10,000 of concrete to Habitat for Humanity, which was used to build a new home for the Haro family in Brigham City, Utah.

The Haros are recent immigrants who went to great lengths to obtain U.S. citizenship. Parents Danika and Everardo have three children, one of whom has autism and is non-verbal. Both Danika and Everardo are deaf. With these special considerations, having a home that is both safe and secure has been a long-time family goal.

This home gives them peace of mind while setting down roots for their children. It gives them structure and routine, helping them feel secure and safe, in addition to having the freedom to play.

Habitat for Humanity of Northern Utah had intended to complete the house before Christmas, but setbacks delayed construction. However, after jumping through hoops with support from generous sponsors, as well as catching a few breaks, the Haro family was able to move just in time for the holidays.

Several Geneva Rock employees contributed to the concrete pour, including three mixer truck drivers, a batch plant operator, and multiple dispatchers. In total, Geneva Rock donated 32 cubic yards of concrete used for the basement foundation.
